Mary's unfailing kindness to others saw generosity and kindness also extended to her.

Teaching and Learning

On Thursday this week, our Inter-School Swimming Carnival was held at Centenary Pool using the carnival management database designed and coded by current Year 12 students while they were in Year 10 completing an information technology subject. Congratulations to Justine Reyes, Natasha Brahne and Charlotte O'Shea for their excellent work in this project ensuring that our carnival ran well from the House nominations, through to the scoring and tracking of broken records and Age Champions.



Our College Diary mentions briefly the types of homework, but it is important to see how students view homework. In Mathematics particularly, it is essential that students see homework as a means to absolutely master a required skill so that progress beyond the skill can happen in the subsequent lessons. Students who tell parents how long they've been working, rather than what they've achieved, risk doing "time" rather than meaningful "learning". The object of the homework is the learning, not the spaces filled with ink. Ask your daughter to explain her work to you when checking homework and you can quickly determine how successful their efforts are in this area. Rather than just remembering facts, they should be looking more deeply at the work to determine patterns and styles so that this can add more meaning to their learning.

In classes, teachers are outlining the Learning Intention and, with the students, determining the Success Criteria. This means that your daughter should be able to tell you WHAT they have been learning in each of their classes and HOW WELL they are going in achieving the expected learnings. Ask them - frequently.

Year 11 students will soon start working on their iSMART goals to inform their study behaviours this term. Essentially, they must identify an area (or two) of priority and determine strategies to assist with achieving success in this area. After identifying the strategies to success and listing the support people to who can assist, students set about making steps toward achieving their goals. The place of homework and revision can also play an important part in this discussion. Academic Mentors are crucial in the conversation between students, parents and your daughter's teachers.

The Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) has made provisions for students to "bank" credits for external courses so that they can be included in the count for Ranks and QCE's in Year 12. This means that students who privately study music, languages or other approved subjects with exams can apply to have them added to their official results from QCAA. Students are directed to negotiate with their private teachers about the entry of qualifications, as schools have no authority to act on any external provider's certification. As well, some students choose to sit for the External Examinations held for the QCAA at the end of their final year. Over the past number of years, we have had students who sit for language exams to take advantage of the extra BONUS RANK points offered by various universities and to boost their ATAR results. Students in Year 12 wishing to complete this exam must make contact with me directly to apply for this opportunity. Exams are available in a number of languages covered by Saturday school classes in many parent communities. Many of our highest achieving students from past years have used bonus rank points to enhance their rankings which, in turn, guaranteed their first choice TAFE options.

The curriculum at Our Lady's College is designed to be flexible – allowing students the time to "add-on" components to their learning. We have an impressive number of senior students who are able to take advantage of this flexibility to include School Based Traineeships and TAFE qualifications. Again, in 2021, we are partnering with external providers to increase the resources available to students. Currently, in Year 12, we have an external provider (Binnacle) offering the Certificate III in Business being delivered onsite during class time. Later in the year, when the registrations for the enhanced studies programs (and other similar programs) become available, more of our students will be able to avail themselves of this opportunity.

Alternative Learning Programs

Some of the options mentioned above result in a variation to a student's timetable. Some students are involved in alternative programs, both within and outside the College, and this results in extra study lessons throughout the week. Students are provided study periods in Ad Altiora Place to support this alternative program.

Assessment Schedules

Assessment schedules for all years are available to students in electronic form via the College's Student Portal and this information is available to parents in the Parent Portal. When these have been checked, they will remain as the final version as reference for parents and students. If you note any variation or discrepancies, please make contact with your daughter's teacher and Curriculum Leader for the subject. At all times, the dates provided on the actual Assessment Items are the official dates for draft and submission of assessments

The Online World of Teenagers

Adolescents today are the first generation to be around the Internet from birth. Teaching young people how to use the Internet safely can be a challenging task for parents when social media platforms change relatively quickly and when we didn't grow up with the technology ourselves.

The esafety Commissioner website promotes safer and more positive Internet experiences. An event promoted by the eSafety Commissioner was Safer Internet Day on the 9th February. This week at school students engaged in conversations and activities during their morning PC classes aimed at promoting positive online experiences.

The eSafety Commissioner supports research about online safety. Last year 12-17 year old's completed an eSafety questionnaire about their Internet usage. Some key findings included:

- Teenagers spend on average 14.4 hours a week of their free time on the Internet.
- Most teenagers use 4 different social media apps with the most popular being YouTube, Instagram, Facebook and Snapchat.
- Tik Tok is increasingly used by teenagers with 38% using the platform in 2020 (compared to 17% in 2017). It is most popular amongst the 13-15 year old age group.
- 44% of teenagers had a negative online experience in the 6 months prior to completing the eSafety survey. The most common negative online experience was being contacted by a stranger or someone not known to them.
- Most teenagers (80%) took action after having a negative online experience. Actions included blocking the person or account, speaking to family/friends, and reporting the online behaviour

Finally, the website offers webinars to help parents to support their child's safe Internet usage. For a description of upcoming webinars check the website here.

Lord Mayor's Youth Advisory Council




